

McDuffee, William Randolph Hearst and Lillian Russell?

(J.H. McDuffee Follow Up Story April 2020 and Fall 2017)

In the Spring 2020 Clan Chatter we recounted the story of J. H. McDuffee who was the President of Prest-O-Lite Battery Company and that he had passed away in 1943. He had quite a life story involving receiving a speeding ticket for traveling faster than 12 miles per hour....in 1899, selling and flying planes, selling automobiles and presiding over a large company.

A short time after the Chatter was issued our Clan Society President was contacted by a descendent of Joseph (Joe) H McDuffee. His name is Tom McDuffee DDS and Joe's grandson. Tom was gracious and has shared further detail about his grandfather from an article in *Collier's National Weekly* from July 1955.

The article was, "The Auto Comes to Stay" by Kyle Crichton a staff writer for *Collier's*.

"In the old days the auto salesman had his problems. It took more than reason to get a sensible man in one of those contraptions with the motor under the seat and a water tank hanging from the rear. The salesman had to be a promoter, a mechanic, a ballyhoo artist, a stunt performer, and a magician.

The first automobile show was held in New York in November 1900, but cars had been sold before that. J. H.



McDuffee, now VP of the Auto-Lite Corporation, represented *Locomobile* in New York in 1899."

McDuffee knew what he was up against and decided to maximize the auto's exposure by convincing the New York Fire Chief to try the car versus the usually effective horses. McDuffee hoped that crowds arriving to the fire would see his car in action. This attempt failed and ended in a near crash and injury to the Fire Chief.

This defeat was followed by another. Both McDuffee in his steam-operated car and Arthur Newton in his Wood Electric car were pinched for exceeding ten miles an hour on Broadway. The disgrace for McDuffee was that he had been overtaken by a bicycle cop—not an excellent advertisement for the merits of his product. (Could this have been an early version of Drag Racing??)

Auto dealers began to go to extremes to prove the autos worth by driving up the steps of buildings to demonstrate power and then show how their brakes worked by driving back down.

“The greatest stunt of all was pulled by Joe McDuffee at the first Madison Square Garden show. J. B. Walker, owner of the *Mobile* auto, had a row with the show managers and was refused space on the show floor. He therefore hired the roof of the Garden for his own show.” Now, how can we attract a crowd outside the main event?

McDuffee solved this by having a wooden runway built from the roof to the statue of Diana, fifty-three feet above. The ramp was in three sections covering 200 feet with a maximum grade of 42%. He then proceeded to repeatedly drive the *Mobile* up and down the incline drawing huge crowds.

William Randolph Hearst was interested in motorcars and the feat on the roof was something his Journal circulation could use. Hearst thought it would be a beautiful thing if Lillian Russel made the trip with Mr. McDuffee. McDuffee thought so too, and the publicity raged until the police stepped in. Due to risk for Lillian Russell, there would be no trip. However, a plot for Lillian to ride with McDuffee was planned for the last day of the event with staged photos being released which again drew large crowds. Lillian being smarter than her agent skipped the event and McDuffee being the consummate auto salesman convinced another young lady in the crowd to accompany him repeatedly up and down the incline.

J. H. McDuffee’s career has been covered in previous editions of the Chatter along with his famous brother Eddie McDuffee, World Record holder in cycling at the turn of the century.

BOOK REVIEW

Scottish National Memorials

A Record of the Historical and Archaeological Collection in the Bishops Castle, Glasgow, 1888 Edited by James Paton

Preface – THIS volume is the outgrowth of the interest excited by the Historical and Archaeological Collection which was brought together in the 'Bishop's Castle' – a reproduction of the ancient Castle of Glasgow, designed by the late Mr. James Sellars and for the Glasgow International Exhibition of 1888. That collection of Scottish National Memorial was the largest that had ever been brought together, and it was felt to be worthy of a more permanent record than could be given by any official catalogue. It was, therefore, determined to prepare a volume which should not only be an illustrated memorial but a national contribution to the History of Scottish Antiquities and a vivid picture of Scottish life. Of that determination the present volume is the fulfilment.

The whole collection has been carefully examined by experts, who have contributed accounts of many relics which are intimately bound up with Scottish history. The more important contributions have been discussed and illustrated in detail, while whatever was deemed of trivial or merely local and limited interest has been either omitted or passed over without comment. The story given with each

object lent, and the story told by the object itself, have been duly weighed. In some cases, it has been found that the appearance of the objects is inconsistent with traditions which have been cherished regarding them, but it has been thought proper, when these traditions themselves were found to be of wide acceptance and venerable antiquity, to give some account of the stories which attach to themselves.

The article upon old Scottish Silverplate and its Hallmarks gives, it is believed, for the first time a full account of the condition of silversmiths' work in various parts of Scotland from many of which it has long disappeared. The paper upon Archery may also be specially mentioned on account of the fulness with which the medals of the Royal Company of Archers have been for the first time described and illustrated: while the very remarkable relic known as the Kennet Ciborium has been made the subject of a thorough historical and scientific investigation and has been illustrated with all completeness. The portions of the work for which the several contributors are responsible are indicated in the Table of Contents. The opinion and advice of these gentlemen were, however, freely communicated on many other points: and substantial contributions from several of them are scattered throughout the entire book. Thus, notes by Mr. John M. Gray [signed 'J.M.G.'] and Mr. Brook [signed 'A.I.S.B.'] will be found in many parts of the work. Thanks are due also to Mr. David Murray, LL.D., and Mr. J. Dalrymple Duncan for several contributions which do not appear in the sections specially connected with their names. In a work containing so much and such varied information, it is impossible to enumerate the names of all who have afforded assistance: but, in addition to those whose names are on the title page, particular mention must be made of Mr. Walter Clark, of the Edinburgh Museum of Science and Art, for his contributions relating to Edinburgh: of Mr. A.H. Constable for his exhaustive description of the Kennet Ciborium: of Mr. Murray Lyon for his paper on the Roman Lodge, and of Dr. Joseph Anderson, of the Society of Antiquaries, for the invaluable assistance that he has rendered throughout the progress of the work, and for the untiring courtesy with which he has placed the resources of the Library of the Society and of the Museum of National Antiquities at the disposal of the Editor and his fellow-workers.

The Publishers also desire to acknowledge the kindness of those who have permitted the use of existing engravings for the purpose of reproduction in this volume. These are acknowledged in detail in the List of Illustrations.

One word as to the arrangement in the volume. The material has been divided into groups, but it has not been possible to preserve the integrity of each group, owing to the interlacing of subjects. A piece of antique silver or of furniture may be found under the heading of Burghal Relics, and not under that of Scottish Plate or Scottish Life. A portrait or a medal may have been dealt with as a historic or personal relic rather than as a work of art. A reference to the Index will, however, remove any inconvenience of search owing to such apparent incongruities.

Highland Dance Spotlight

WHAT IS HIGHLAND DANCE?

About Highland Dance: “Scottish Highland Dancing is a celebration of the Scottish spirit. The dances are a spectacular strength, agility, movement, Unlike other dance mediums, generally danced solo and in Dancers typically dance to music such as Strathspeys, and Jigs all played by an bagpiper, Highland dancing was preformed by men but is now and women. The Highland Fling: “Likely the oldest of the traditional dances of Scotland, the Highland Fling signifies victory following a battle. The warriors made this dance a feat of strength and agility by dancing on their upturned shields which had a sharp spike of steel projecting from the center. Dancers learned early to move with great skill and dexterity. Others say the Highland Fling was inspired by the sight of a deer prancing on a hillside. The upraised arms and hands in the dance represent the deer’s antlers.

The Sword Dance: “Legend has it that the initial Ghillie Callum was created by Malcolm Canmore, a Celtic Prince who fought a battle in 1054. Triumphant, he crossed his opponent’s sword with his own and danced over them celebrating his victory. It is also said that the Highland warriors danced the Sword Dance prior to battle. If the warrior touched the swords, it was considered a bad omen, alluding to injury or death in battle.”

Seann Triubhas (Old Trouser): “This dance originated as a pollical protest dating back to 1745 when the wearing of the kilt was an act of treason. Pronounced “shawn trews,” this Gaelic phrase means “old trousers.” The beautiful, graceful steps reflect the restrictions imposed by the foreign trousers. The lively quick time in the dance recreates the Highlanders’ celebration of rediscovered freedom.”

April 6th was chosen as Tartan Day to commemorate the signing of the Declaration of Arbroath. The Declaration of letter which set out to statue as an state as well as its use of unjustly attacked. sent to Pope John XXII The Declaration was to the Pope. Abbot likely drafted it on barons of Scotland. The one from King Robert from four Scottish

Arbroath was a formal confirm Scotland’s independent, sovereign military action when Written Latin, it was in 1320. one of three letters sent Bernard of Abbey most behalf of the nobles and other letters included Bruce himself and one bishops, attempting to

abate the papal hostility. Of these, Declaration is the sole survivor. The hand-written parchment received the seals of several Scottish barons and was then taken to the papal court at Avignon in France by Sire Adam Gordon.




